

ALBUMEN PRINT - REGIMENTAL FLAG, 2ND MASS CAVALRY

This albumen print is a photograph of the regimental silk color presented to the 2^{nd} Massachusetts Cavalry at war's end by their outgoing colonel, Caspar Crowninshield. The image retains exceptional clarity with only minor age toning. It remains in its original matte and bears a 3 cent revenue stamp on the verso. The image is approximately 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ " X $\frac{6}{2}$ " and is contained in its original 8" X 10" matte.

Crowninshield personally designed the flag and had it prepared in Boston. It bears the California state seal with ribands containing the words "Eureka" and "2^d Mass. Cavalry." The verso is painted with the seal of the state of Massachusetts. The flag bears twenty five battle honors for actions in which the 2^{nd} Mass Cav participated.

After Appomattox, Crowninshield resigned and returned to Massachusetts. Command of the regiment devolved to a Californian, Archibald KcKendry who served until the muster out in July, 1865. In a letter to Governor Frederick F. Low of California, and quoted in the Alta California newspaper dated February 22, 1866 (pg. 371-372, <u>Their Horses Climbed Trees</u> by Larry Rogers) McKendry laid the groundwork for the presentation of the flag to the golden state.
