fit to assume & discharge the duties and responsibilities  
 devolving upon an Officer of any grade  
 whatever

## LETTER RECOMMENDING AGAINST PROMOTION – 2<sup>ND</sup> MASS CAV

Original letter to E. D. Townsend, Assistant Adjutant General of the Army sent from near Falls Church, Virginia on June 24, 1864. The letter appears to have been written by members of the 2nd Mass Cavalry recommending against the pending promotion of Pvt. T. M. Chisholm to the rank of an officer. Pvt. T. Melville Chisholm, a 24 year old clerk who enlisted in the 2nd Mass Cav on June 20, 1863 had been ordered by General Order No. 216 from the Adjutant General's Office of the War Department to report to Louisville, Kentucky where he was to be commissioned an officer in a colored troop regiment.

The letter states, in part, "We take this method to express to the appointing power our firm conviction based upon our own observation for a long time and also the reports of his Co. officers upon which we can implicitly rely that Private Chisholm is a man totally unfit for an Officer or even a non-commissioned officer of any troops either colored or white, the principal reason for which being a want of moral energy." Apparently the protest was dismissed, as Pvt. Chisholm was promoted to the rank of 2nd Lieutenant in the 108th Colored Infantry on June 27, three days after the date of this letter. He survived the war and was discharged with the balance of the 108<sup>th</sup>.
